




## Password protect PDF documents

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You can secure a PDF file so that it can only be viewed if you know the PDFs password. Why is this useful? Assume that you are lawyer and you need to file something "under seal" and you are in a jurisdiction that only allows electronic filing. The way that electronic filing works in most jurisdictions that use it is that you simply upload the file or E-mail it in to the court, at which point the document is immediately available to everyone who wants to view it. Not good if you are filing something under seal, because the whole point is to limit access to the document.

With PDFs document security you are able to file a secure version of the document and then call the court to tell them the password. The password could then be distributed in a secure method to everyone who is supposed to have access to the document.

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
